

Students had the unique opportunity to explore the real-life capabilities of AI through engaging, hands-on activities. The session kicked off with an innovative music video and song writing brief that demonstrated how AI tools can enhance creative processes.



There was also a demonstration where students explored AI prompts by guiding a blindfolded Mr Osborne through a maze, showing the importance of clear instructions when communicating with artificial intelligence systems.

The excitement reached new heights when students were introduced to Lexi, the AI-powered compu-dog. Lexi delighted everyone with her clever tricks, showcasing how AI can be programmed to respond to commands and interact with humans in entertaining ways.


The STEM Roadshow continues to be an essential part of our curriculum enrichment program, inspiring the next generation of innovators and problemsolvers.

Young Voices

The Equality And Rights Advocates (EARA) team at St Peter's have been planning a special project to revamp the Buddy Benches in the Key Stage 1 and Key Stage 2 playgrounds.

Before they started, these were plain benches which were not being used for the correct purpose - to be a place to go for those who can't find a friend. The EARA team have added a brightly-coloured label to make the benches stand out, and rules for how to use the Buddy Bench correctly. The rules of the Buddy Bench were shared with the whole school during assemblies, where the EARA team acted out different scenarios of people using the bench (some correct and others incorrect) and the children had to guess which were the correct uses. Everyone now know how to use the Buddy Bench if they are feeling left-out or lonely, or what to do if they see someone else sitting on the bench because they feel this way. Hopefully this will be a useful spot for children and help them to build new friendships.

First Holy Communion

St Paul's Catholic Primary School worked with the parish of St Colman's and St Paul's to deliver a First Holy Communion programme using the resource 'I belong'. We have been running this joint programme for the last five years. There are 12 preparation sessions that run from October to June for one hour after school at St Paul's school, including 4 parent sessions. We have 6 catechists, all of whom are St Paul's staff, and our parish priest Father Andrew.

On Saturday 21st June and Sunday 22nd June forty-two children from the parish of St Colman and St Paul made their First Holy Communion at St Colman's Church, where they received our Lord for the very first time in the presence of their family, friends and catechists. Father Andrew, along with his altar servers and St Paul's music ministry led beautiful services across the weekend.

Of the forty-two candidates twenty-one were children from St Paul's.

Thank you to everyone who made this a holy and memorable occasion for our children.

On Monday 23rd June the children from St Paul's were invited to come, dressed in their clothes from the celebration, into the hall for a very special Celebration of the Word dedicated to all those children who received the Eucharist for the very first time. The children had a small gathering afterwards to celebrate together which included lemonade and cupcakes!
