Sunday Reflection

THEME: WHAT IS YOUR MISSION IN THIS WORLD?

At the beginning of a term of office, presidents or elected/appointed leaders normally make an inaugural speech to tell those they are to govern, what exactly they have as mission as well as their expectations, road map and where they want to be at the end of their tenure of office. This is what Donald Trump did last Monday when he took office as the next president of America. This is precisely what Jesus does in the second part of the gospel of today. He is in the Synagogue and is asked to read and say few words. He takes the scroll of the book of the prophet Isaiah and reads from chapter six, verses one to two (61:1-2) which says: "The Spirit of the Lord has been given to me, for he has anointed me. He has sent me to bring the good news to the poor, to proclaim liberty to captives and to the blind new sight, to set the downtrodden free, to proclaim the Lord's year of favour." This is exactly the mission Jesus defended throughout his public ministry and completed by his suffering, death and resurrection. But his mission is not ended. He has handed over the mission to us.

By our baptism, we accepted to continue this mission of Jesus. Baptism makes us to become kings (leaders), priests (sanctifiers) and prophets (messengers of the good news). I would like us to link our prophetic mission given to us at baptism with Jesus' first mission as established in his inaugural speech: to bring the good news to the poor.

Our first question will be to ask ourselves: who are the poor who need to hear the good news? Are they non-Christians, pagans, members of other religions, atheists? Not at all! We are all poor and need the Good News. To be poor means a lack, a deprivation, or the absence of something. Poverty can take two forms: material or physical poverty and spiritual poverty. The former will mean lack of money, infrastructures, basic amenities, etc while the latter will mean lack of knowledge about the things of God.

Many of us, even practicing Christians, are rich materially but are spiritual dwarfs because most of us lack knowledge about the things of God. I would not like to embarrass anyone otherwise I would have asked a few of us questions to answer, it might be just to name the Ten Commandments, the sacraments, say some prayers of the Church, or basic things about our doctrine and devotions in the Church.

In the world, we need knowledge to be able to operate and function well. Come to think of a nurse, doctor, engineer, teacher, banker, etc. who doesn't have knowledge about his or her field. That kind of professional could end up causing troubles at the workplace. In a sense, such a person is useless. In the world, we see that there are frequent seminars and trainings organized at workplaces to update workers so that they match up with the current thoughts of the time (professional development). What about our spiritual life? Do we update the knowledge we have in our spiritual life? Could it be that the only knowledge you have about your faith, is what you learned as doctrine in preparation for First Holy Communion or marriage or Confirmation; presuming we still remember things. Even if we still remember, why don't we update our knowledge? Why do we glory in living in spiritual poverty? Some of us cannot even remember how we pray the Rosary, or say the common prayers of the Church, talk less of the responses at mass. If that were in the medical field you should be deprived of your licence.

Dear friends, many of us are spiritually poor. We need to update our knowledge about the things of God. We must begin by making scriptures part and parcel of our lives, then taking up time to read the Catechism of the Catholic Church. Returning from exile, the Jews had forgotten about the Word of God. Ezra in the first reading of today took time from morning to afternoon to open the minds of the people to God's word. We need to learn to study and pray the Word of God. It's there that God can help us to see clearly how to carry out our mission in the world.

In the second reading, St. Paul uses the analogy of the body to show that no part of the body is indispensable. Every part has its own use. We too in the Church have our own use or charism, or purpose for which God created us. We must work towards building up the body of Christ, which is about God's people all over the world. He has given us gifts; of healing, teaching, helping, leadership, tongues, etc to use for this purpose. Identify your own gifts and use them to bring God's Good News, first to ourselves, and then to the rest of the world.

As we celebrate this day, let us pray for the graces to fall in love with the Word of God. May we cherish it, study it and live by it all the days of our lives.
