Eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Sunday 2nd March 2025

Masses at 10 am and 6.30 pm on Ash Wednesday, 5th March, this week, the beginning of Lent.

Ecclesiasticus Book of Sirach: 27: 4-7 1 Corinthians 15: 54-58 **Gospel Luke 6: 39-45** This weekend's readings focus on important lessons about how we speak, act and live as Christians The first reading from the Book of Sirach, written almost 200 years before Christ, states that people's faults appear when they speak, especially when they speak and aren't considering their words. We often hide behind masks, but conversation reveals our inner thoughts and a means of testing the inner character of a person. Sirach's teaching is very relevant for human integrity in today's world of public relations, image making, the sound bite and the slogan There used to be a motto in the business world "My word is my bond". A transaction worth millions could be completed by a few words and a shake of the hand. Unfortunately today one's word is frequently not trusted as one's bond. What missing is personal integrity, a quality that is very important. In the second reading from St Paul's letter to the Corinthians he explains that through Christ we have victory over death which gives us hope and courage to stand firm in our faith. He encourages us to work hard in the Lord's service as our efforts are never in vain when done for God's glory. Paul's message ties in with the words of Sirach in the first reading as purity in words and heart is crucial for sharing in God's ultimate victory over death. Death is not the end, through Christ we have eternal life. Luke's Gospel is continuing the Sermon on the Plain and Jesus teaches us that we must address our own faults before criticising or judging others. Self examination leads to true humility. Jesus warns about the dangers of following blind guides. We must seek true wisdom and guidance in our leaders. He compares people to trees, saying that good trees bear good fruit.

Our actions and words should display personal integrity and good hearts. By aligning our words, actions and hearts with these

6 pm Confessions 6.30pm Vigil Mass Ruth Gleeson RIP	Saturday 1st March St David of Wales Born in about 500 during a storm, her mother a nun who had been raped by a Prince. Was educated at a monastery by Abbot St Paulinus A great preacher and teacher. Founded twelve monasteries including Glastonbury Abbey, Caldey Island and Mynyw in Pembrokeshire where he stayed. Led an austere life style. Only drank water and ate only bread, herbs and vegetables. Strict regime of religious activities and hard work in the fields, crafts and beekeeping. Bishop of Menevia in South Wales. Advisor to his uncle King Arthur. Missionary work in Wales and south of England as far as Winchester. Bishop David died on 1 st March 1601 aged about 101. Tomb at St David's Cathedral in Haverfordwest, Pembrokeshire became a shrine and a place of pilgrimage.

12 noon: Requiem Mass for Ruth Gleeson 6.30 pm Mass	Monday 3rd St Katherine Drexel Born in 1858 in America, youngest of two sisters. Her mother died and her father remarried and had another daughter. A loving prayerful family who helped the poor. Three girls promoted the rights of Native Indian Americans and Black Afro Americans opposed by Ku Klux Klan. Set up schools and missions. Katherine founded Order of nuns, <i>Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament</i> , to work with the two ethnic groups. She started a Training College in New Orleans to train teachers in teaching the Afro-American pupils. This became the Xavier University, the first Catholic University in the South for Indian and Black students. She established Convent in Columbus, Ohio, Chicago, Boston and New York. Katherine died 3 rd March 1955 aged 96. Patron saint of racial justice.							
10 am Mass	Tuesday 4th St Casimar of Poland Born in 1458 at Wawel Castle, Kraków, Poland second son of King Casimir IV of Poland and Grand Duke of Lithuania. Prince Casimir was brought up by his loving mother and a priest. Prayerful youth who helped the poor. Involved in a war and had to lead an army aged only 13. Made peace much to the annoyance of his father. Vowed never to take up arms again. Became a young man of exceptional intellect, education, humility and friendliness. Pleaded with his father to act more justly. Gave his wealth to the poor. Refused marriage. Austere and holy life. Eventually gave way to his father and took over the Lithuania Chancellery. Extremely able in problem

Ash Wednesday 5th March St Agnes of Bohemia Born in 1211 in Prague, daughter of the King of Bohemia. Initially educated by Cistercians in Trebnitz. Betrothed to be married to a variety of royals but none succeeded. Founded friaries, monasteries and a hospital. 46 years a nun in the Poor Clares at Convent of St Saviour in Prague which she built and founded. Life of prayer and works of charity. Abbess Agnes enjoyed menial tasks in the Convent. Died 6 th March 1282 aged 71.							
10 am Mass	Thursday 6th St Colette of Corbie Born 1381 in France. Carpenter's daughter. Orphaned aged17. Tried being a lay religious in two Orders. Franciscan hermit aged 21 for 4 years. Had visions of St Francis of Assisi to make the <i>Poor Clares</i> observe stricter rules of austerity. Antipope Benedict XIII gave her powers to reform the <i>Poor Clares</i> . She met a lot of opposition. Eventually started new convents with rule of absolute poverty and went barefoot. Rules of fasting and abstinence. 18 convents							

in her lifetime with her nuns that were known as Colettine Sisters. Died 6th March 1447 aged 66.
