Sunday Reflection

THEME: THE END DOES NOT JUSTIFY THE MEANS

On 3rd May 1469 in Italy, a boy was born. He grew up to become a diplomat, politician, historian, philosopher, humanist, and writer. He was a diplomat for 14 years when the Medici family was in exile. When the family returned to power in 1502, he was dismissed and briefly jailed. This person died in 1527. He lived for 58 years but his writings changed the cause of modern political science. In fact, he is the father of modern political science. He is Niccolo Machiavelli. He is famous for "The Prince", a book written in 1513. In it, he describes how to get to power and maintain it. To do this, immoral acts such as dishonesty and killings of innocent ones are being considered to be normal and effective in politics. His political thought is said to be the brain behind politics in Africa and many other parts of the world. For Machiavelli, "the end justifies the means", that is, anything you wish to do or achieve, use any means to accomplish it; be it killing, dishonesty, cheating, etc. But his philosophy is morally wrong even though highly applicable in the world over.

On the contrary, Jesus presents to us the morally applicable principle we must consider in any choice, especially when faced with temptation. This has to do with the fact that "THE END DOES NOT JUSTIFY THE MEANS". This is indicative of the fact that no matter how good our end or goal may be, we must consider the right means to achieve that end or goal. If the means is not morally acceptable, then we must drop it. For example, to support the Church or a poor beggar in terms of finance is a good end. But we can't steal (means) from others to achieve this end. That will be morally wrong.

The teaching of Jesus is presented to us within the context of his temptation as Luke narrates in the gospel of today. The three temptations Jesus faced, had a morally good end but the means to achieve those ends were bad. He overcame them and refused to use the wrong means to achieve the end. The three temptations are placed within the context of the need for food, power and glory, and the need to prove oneself.

In the first temptation, Jesus is confronted with the need to satisfy hunger. When we are hungry, we need food. But we can't use the wrong means, like stealing, in order to have food. Realizing how hungry Jesus was, Satan came to tempt him: "If you are the Son of God, tell this stone to turn into a loaf". Jesus refused to fall into this temptation because even though he was hungry, he had no duty to listen to the devil by turning stone into bread to prove that he is the Son of God.

Satan did not give up but brought in another strategy. He thought he would attract Jesus through earthly power, fame,

glory, or earthly accomplishments. After showing Jesus all the kingdoms of the world, he demanded of him: "I will give you all this power and the glory of these kingdoms, for it has been committed to me and I give it to anyone I choose. Worship me, and it shall all be yours". Indeed, the devil is very smart. He knows that humans crave for glory and power and wanted Jesus to achieve that through false worship. Just a simple bow to the devil would have given Jesus the whole world. Jesus refused this. I am sure for many of us, we would have accepted the test. After all, I can go for confession thereafter and God will understand. Jesus is teaching us in this temptation that nothing; be it wealth, money, fame, power, glory, houses, cars, etc., should confuse and take us away from God. These things are good but get them using the right means.

Finally, Satan comes back to Jesus and wants him to prove he is son of God. He wants him to prove his personality. And so he takes him to Jerusalem to the parapet of the Temple and tells Jesus to throw himself down from there, since scripture says God will send his angels to protect him. But Jesus refused to succumb to the devil. It would have meant nothing to prove he is the Son of God. We find him in the gospel proving his Son-ship not to show off, but to help others. We too are often faced with the temptation of trying to prove ourselves. For those with low self-esteem, they can go any length to do that. But those who know who they are and what they are worth, they know that there is no need to prove themselves. Remember that everyone has his or her opinion about you. You can't live your life struggling to prove who you are. Just go on living your life in the fear of the Lord and He will do the rest for you. Those who want to prove themselves eventually get hurt because presenting yourself as the pleasing type never really helps anyone.

As we have started our Lenten journey, let us know that the end doesn't justify the means. We shouldn't use wrong means to reach a noble end. That is why we need to pray and fast, asking Jesus for the graces to overcome temptations. May these weeks of Lent be an opportunity to do this.

CONTINUATION OF ANNOUNCEMENTS

PARISH FINANCES: Could you heat your house for £1 a week? Probably not, so think about the size of the churches and how much it costs to heat them so that you are warm when you attend Mass. Because St. Joseph's has not been open for two years, we have no bills for comparison, but two years ago, before we were shut down, the bill was more than £900 for three months for St. Joseph's and over £900 a month for Corpus Christi plus approx £1,400 in standing orders – the weekly collection for both churches is in the region of £300 or less. We'll leave you to do the sums, but the income is nothing like the expenditure (and that is only for the gas, let alone everything else!). We all know that gas and electricity prices have rocketed recently so we are expecting a hefty bill in March.

We are coming to the time of year when we give out Gift Aid envelopes for the next 12 months. This year, we are not only appealing for people to consider taking out a standing order instead of envelopes, but for those people who already have standing orders, to increase them. Many of you will have been in the scheme for years and never increased the amount you give. Could you give another £5 a month or more perhaps? Every little helps.

JUBILEE PLANNING MEETING OUTCOME

On Monday 3rd Feb. 2025 at SJ church at 7pm, we had a meeting to plan the parish activities during this jubilee year, Pilgrims of Hope. At the end of the meeting, the following was decided: The Jubilee prayer and the prayer of hope will be printed and laminated and used for prayers in our churches throughout the jubilee year.
