Sunday Reflection

THEME: THE BLESSINGS OF HOSPITALITY

Hospitality has been defined as a friendly or generous reception and entertainment of a guest, visitor or stranger. It has to do with welcoming others and making them feeling being welcomed as well. This is what the readings of today are inviting us to practice always as a sign of true Christian living. It guarantees us that when we practice hospitality, there are blessings that accrue from it.

In the first reading, we find Abraham taking his rest at the entrance to his tent during the hottest part of the day at the Oak of Mamre. As he was resting, he saw three men whom he beckoned not to pass by without resting in his house. As the people accepted his offer, he disturbed the wife's comfort by asking her to prepare loaves of bread and the servant to prepare a calf for his guests. When everything was ready, he personally served them and being satisfied with his hospitality, the men decided to bless him and the wife with the promise of a child that same time the following year. One thing that is remarkable about Abraham's hospitality is that he did not even know these people whom he personally served. He served Angels without knowing and was blessed thereafter.

In the gospel as well, Jesus is accorded hospitality by Martha and Mary. Jesus comes to their home and is welcomed by Martha who stays in the kitchen preparing something for him and Mary at his feet listening to him. This is a challenge to us to find out how we welcome guests and strangers who come to our homes, offices, shops, etc. Are we hospitable to them? Personally, I am happy when I visit a home or office and I am welcomed and well taken care of and this has challenged me to always do the same to others who come my way. It is a virtue we all can strive to practice each day so that it eventually becomes a habit.

In the gospel story of today, we can see that Jesus wants us to realize that hospitality takes various forms. It's not just about physical entertainment, like Abraham and Martha did, but about a spiritual reality. In most part, hospitality should deal with giving our time to listening to God who comes to visit us daily. Martha was carried away by serving but Mary went for the listening part: sitting at the feet of Jesus and relishing from his banquet of eternal Word. That is why Jesus advocates that Mary chose the better part because the Word of God is far more important.

Therefore, apart from ordinary entertainment of visitors, guests and strangers, we need to go deeper by entertaining the Word of God in our lives. God wants us to be hospitable to Him by reading his Word in Scriptures and by listening to him in prayers. We do sometimes and for other, often neglect this.

The above notwithstanding, I would like to share few things we ought to take into consideration when we practice hospitality. They are all drawn from the readings of today.

- 1. In hospitality, we take the first step by judging the needs of the others first and act without any hope of expecting something in return. It should be gratuitous. This is what Abraham did.
- 2. Hospitality calls on us to sacrifice our time, money and other resources for the sake of others. In a sense, hospitality goes with the burden a burden on the host. Abraham, Martha and Mary did just that. We too can do that.
- 3. In practicing hospitality, we must be humble servants in the manner of Abraham. Without humility and servanthood, we will find it difficult to practice this virtue.
- 4. Finally, hospitality affords us the opportunity to change our own programme for the sake of the others. It is not something easy. Abraham was resting and probably the wife and servant. But in the face of these strangers, their programmes were all changed to accommodate their needs.

Dear friends, one thing that is sure about being hospitable is that God always reward us for our hospitality. We should never be afraid to practice this virtue daily despite the abuses that have gone with it. It is true that people have welcomed strangers in their homes in the name of hospitality and these people ended up dubbing them or stealing from them. It is painful, but we must remember that abuse does not take away use. Many today pose as destitutes in need of our hospitality. God too today pose like a destitute in need of our hospitality. What is needed of us is prudence, discernment, patience, change of personal program and God's guidance in the practice of hospitality.

As we strive each day to be hospitable, we should never practice it out of self-interest but for the sake of the love for mankind.
