

Why is July Dedicated to the Precious Blood?

Devotion to the Most Precious Blood by the saints and the faithful dates back to the beginnings of the Church. We read in Sacred Scripture many verses that honor the blood of Christ as the source of our salvation. Saint Peter writes, "You know that you were ransomed from the futile ways inherited from your fathers, not with perishable things such as silver or gold, but with the **precious blood of Christ**, like that of a lamb without blemish or spot." (1 Peter 1:19)

The Most Precious Blood became a focus for Pope Pius IX while he was in exile during the Italian War for Independence. The Pope understood the great need for God's intervention and instituted the Feast of the Most Precious Blood to be celebrated in July 1849. The purpose was to call upon assistance from Heaven to end the war. Soon after the formal institution of the feast, the war ended



and the Pope returned to Rome, his prayers having been answered. Eventually, the entire month of July became dedicated to the Most Precious Blood.

The Church, therefore, encourages all the faithful to honor and recognize with particular attention during the month of July the blood of Jesus shed for us during His passion and crucifixion. Being reminded of the tremendous sacrifice of Our loving Savior in the Masses and prayers of this month, we are moved to express deep gratitude to God for the saving power of His blood and the gift of salvation it has merited.

When a Catholic dies, it is the usual custom of the Catholic Church for them to be brought to their parish church & for a Requiem Mass to be offered up for them. This is the case even for those who during their lifetime rarely practiced their Catholic faith. Catholics believe that when a person dies, it is a priority to offer Mass, because it is the Sacrifice of Christ & in the Mass the Church pleads to the Lord, asking him to forgive the sins and weaknesses of the deceased & to admit them into the communion of the saints. CANONISATION ANNOUNCEMENT: THE SAINTS OF YOUTH

the Holy Father announced that London-born Blessed Carlo Acutis alongside Blessed Pier Giorgio Frassati will be canonised together on 7 September. The canonisations of the two young saints — one from the early twentieth century, the other the first millennial saint — have been greatly anticipated due to the great devotion among the faithful.

This Newsletter covers a two-week period. The next Newsletter will be issued on Sunday, 27 July.

The parish of St Mary's and St Columba's - Gosport, is part of the Solent Pastoral Area, a group of four parishes which includes Fareham, Stubbington and Lee-on-the-Solent, and Park Gate. The Diocesan Ten-year Plan entitled "You will be my Witnesses" calls for all the parishes in the diocese to work together, holding joint services, combining efforts for sacramental preparation, and resource-sharing.

REFLECTION

What must I do?

In the Gospel Reading, a lawyer asks Jesus, "What must I do to inherit eternal life?" Jesus says to the lawyer, well, how do you read the law? Without hesitation, the lawyer gives Jesus the answer, which the lawyer already knew - love God wholly and your neighbour as yourself.

If you can do good to him, he counts as your neighbour.

Right!, Jesus tells him. You do that, and you'll live.

But wait, the lawyer says, who is my neighbour?

Then Jesus tells him the story of the bad priest and Levite and the good Samaritan, and Jesus finishes with another question to the lawyer: which of these was the neighbour of the robbery victim?

The lawyer gives the answer he has to give: the good neighbour was the Samaritan.

Now notice the oddness of the lawyer's first question. He doesn't ask: what is the best way to soar in love of God? He asks: what *must* I do to inherit eternal life? He is looking for the minimum necessary to get in to heaven, isn't he?

But eternal life is a union, a marriage, with God. Who would want to get married to someone who said, "what's the minimum I can do for you and with you and still get you to marry me?"

So Jesus gets the lawyer to answer his question, and the lawyer gives the right answer. What you *have* to do, the minimum necessary, is everything: love God wholly, and love your neighbour as yourself.

This is a disconcerting answer, of course, because in this life none of us is ever going to do everything. So if *everything* is the minimum necessary, then none of us is getting in. And so the lawyer tries on his original move again. He wants a definition of *neighbour* which gives him the minimum number of people to count as neighbours he has to love.

But Jesus upends the lawyer's continuing desire for a minimum by giving him another maximum: everyone you can love is your neighbour. If you can do good to him, he counts as your neighbour.

And that is what we *must* do to inherit eternal life: come to Christ. The lawyer's own answers to his questions are right. But giving everything in love for God is a holiness we can find only through Christ's unstinting outpouring of love for us.

Has the attitude of people in the UK to their neighbours become like that of those who walked on by in the parable of the Good Samaritan, and if so, how did we get there? The parable of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10:25–37) challenges us to redefine "neighbour" not by proximity or similarity, but by compassion and action. The Samaritan, despite being from a despised group, showed mercy to a stranger—while others who might have been expected to help walked by. So, has the UK embraced this ethic of radical neighbourliness?

The UK Today: Good Samaritan or Bystander?

Signs of Good Samaritan Spirit

- **Community responses during crises**: During the COVID-19 pandemic, thousands of mutual aid groups sprang up across the UK, with neighbours helping the vulnerable with food, medicine, and companionship.
- Charitable giving and volunteering: The UK consistently ranks high in global generosity indexes, with millions volunteering their time and money to help others.
- Public support for refugees and the homeless: Despite political tensions, many Britons have opened their homes to Ukrainian refugees and supported local shelters.

Signs of Declining Neighbourliness

- Social isolation: Loneliness is now considered a public health crisis in the UK, especially among the elderly and young adults.
- Rise in individualism: Economic pressures, digital lifestyles, and political polarisation have made people more inward-looking and less engaged with their local communities.
- Hostility toward outsiders: Some rhetoric around immigration, Brexit, and national identity has fostered suspicion rather than solidarity. How Did We Get Here?

Several cultural and structural shifts have shaped this trajectory:

- Economic inequality: Austerity measures and housing crises have widened the gap between rich and poor, eroding trust and empathy.
- **Digital disconnection**: Social media can create echo chambers and reduce face-to-face interactions, making it easier to ignore those outside our bubble.
- **Political polarisation**: Previous debates over Brexit, and currently on immigration and national identity, have sometimes turned neighbours into ideological opponents.
- Loss of shared moral frameworks: As religious affiliation declines, so too might the communal values that once underpinned neighbourly obligations.

A Way Forward?

The parable of the Good Samaritan reminds us that compassion is not a passive feeling but an active choice. If the UK is to reclaim that spirit, it may require:

- Rebuilding local communities through shared spaces, events, and initiatives.
- Teaching empathy and civic responsibility in schools and public discourse.
- Challenging prejudice and expanding our definition of who counts as "neighbour."
- Understanding and embracing the command of Jesus to love our neighbour as ourselves.

Would you say your own experience in your community reflects more of the Samaritan spirit - or more of the priest and Levite who passed by?
