Visio Divina is a beautiful, ancient form of prayer that invites us to encounter the divine through images. It's a contemplative practice, similar to Lectio Divina (divine reading), but instead of using scripture, you use images or art to guide your thoughts and connect with God.

In essence, Visio Divina is about wearing 'God-glasses' to see the world through a lens that reveals deeper truths and invites God to speak directly to your heart. It's about being open to the visible helping the invisible to arise, perhaps in a profound way.


You can choose any visual element as a tool for meditation; anything that resonates: sacred images, photos, paintings, icons; anything that helps us to connect with the divine and to view life through a sacred lens, perhaps uncovering something new. All of life then becomes hallowed ground.

Visio Divina can be practiced individually, with a prayer partner or in a small group.

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Visio Divina can be practiced individually, with a prayer partner or in a small group. Firstly, though, and as a bit of a warm up (for those who might not have prayed this way before), you might cast your eye over the eight images on the previous pages. Slowly and gently let your eyes move around from one to the other....and notice which (if any) you feel drawn to. Does one particular image attract you?

After a short while, try to settle on one.

- Relax and gaze at it. All around it: the shapes, the colours, the feel, the detail.
- Perhaps ponder why you're attracted to it.
- Is the image saying something to you?
- Does it, can it, in some way, reflect 'where you are' or perhaps something in your day so far? Something from yesterday?
- Just breathe and notice; be open....
- Let the thoughts arise and let God be involved.
- After a little while maybe just a few minutes move your concentration and gaze away from your chosen image and ponder what (if anything) came up for you.
- You might want to have a chat with God about it.
- You might choose to make a note of/journal anything that felt significant – if anything did.

### You might want to try these simple steps:

- Settle in a comfortable place without distraction and relax. Close your eyes and focus on your breath.
- When you're ready, open your eyes, and gaze at the whole image. Notice shapes, colours, lighting, detail, foreground, background.
- What draws your attention? Are you being lured by God to a treasure that's just for you?
- Ponder the part of the picture that has drawn your attention
- How is God speaking to you?
- Why do you think God drew your attention to this particular part?
- Is a message conveyed that relates to your life today?
- Do you perhaps sense an invitation or hear a call?
- Is a memory aroused?
- Allow these thoughts to descend into your heart.
- What emotion is evoked?
- What word describes your inner stirring as you embrace this feeling?
- Allow God's communication to touch you deeply.
- Respond to God.
- Share any yearnings or desires that have arisen.
- Now turn to silence. Simply rest in communion with God. Savour the stillness. Be soothed by Love.

### **Carmelite Secular Order**

Influences for our choices come from many directions. I grew up in the west of Ireland where our parish church had a statue of Thérèse of Lisieux. I was fascinated by her, not least that she died at the age of twenty-four and was hidden for nine years in an enclosed Carmelite convent, dying unknown to the world at large. Her little Way of Surrender and Confidence and her last words, "I go to Him with confidence and Love," have always inspired me.

Moving on, I was introduced to the works of St John of the Cross when I was a nun in a teaching order. I did not find him easy reading at first, but was drawn to his poetry, and the Spiritual Canticle opened for me the love song between God and the soul:

Where have you hidden, Beloved, and left me moaning? You fled like the stag after wounding me; I went out calling you, but you were gone.

John brought me into the mystery of God's presence, hidden in the depths of our hearts and lives and his words, "I have neither guide nor light except that which burns in my heart" resounded deep within me, and still do; as do the words from Hosea Ch 2: v14 'I will now allure her and bring her into the wilderness and speak tenderly to her'.

After leaving the convent and getting married, I discovered the Carmelite Secular Order in 1988 when my sister Penelope, who was already a member, told me about the Community. There was a priory in Wincanton with several Carmelite friars and I joined the Secular Order based there, directed by one of the friars. It was, and has been, a wonderful discovery of belonging to an Order whose saints have inspired so many of us. St Teresa of Avila, Saint Therese of Lisieux, St John of the Cross, St Teresa Benedicta of the Cross, St Elizabeth of the Trinity and countless others have become



close friends and mentors in the spiritual life, above all in their love for Jesus, their persevering prayer and insights into the Scriptures, their struggles in the midst of suffering, darkness and despair and their love for all of creation 'where there is no love, put love and you will draw out love' (letter 26: John of the Cross).


Being a Secular Order Carmelite gives one a structure to one's daily life. We commit ourselves to personal prayer, daily Mass if possible, Morning and Evening Prayer of the Church, spiritual reading and monthly meetings with our local communities. Once a year we have a retreat given by one of our Carmelite friars and we meet on a regional basis also once a year, which is an opportunity to meet up

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with communities from other parts of the area inwhich we live.

Being immersed in the Scriptures and life of the church, getting to know and love our Carmelite saints, who have gone before us and those hidden among us, has been a continuing joy and inspiration and I wake each morning thanking the Lord for bringing me into the Order and giving me Love, Life and Light. I am more and more aware as I get older and can do physically less and less that prayer is truly the fulcrum that lifts the world into the heart of God. Le point vièrge are the praying hands as one author framed it. We can just BE where we are in the presence of the Beloved; 'in Him we live and move and have our being', and in his Love we are centred with our feet on earth and our hearts in heaven. Alleluia!

### I heard a Siskin in My Garden

The Merlin App on my phone told me that there was a Siskin singing in my garden. I had to look up a picture of a Siskin to find out what it looked like.

This beautiful bird, created by God, has probably always graced my garden, but its presence was unnoticed by me because I never spent long enough listening to the identity recording on my phone. I always thought I knew what birds it would identify, so why wait for anything new!

A long period of pain and forced inactivity has made this a metaphor for my life. To be grounded as an injured bird might lead to death. Being grounded as child of God, has led me to a new language of life. I don't know what God wants to show me; I have never waited around long enough to find out.

Any gift or talent I might ever have been given has been stripped away during this time and I have learnt new, spiritually positive meanings for lack of independence, lack of control and complete inactivity. I fight against it, but I have no choice but to trust in God, accept his timing, listen and wait.

It is hugely uncomfortable for me not to fix things which I would have considered needed to be done, but this brings a freedom in seeing that either someone else will do them or they weren't essential anyway.

I am watching this working out in my garden. Will this rose survive if I don't disentangle it from the plant which is choking it? We will find out when it either does or doesn't come back next year. I trust that God knows what His plan is for the rose, as he does for my recovery. How much? How long?

Never before has the prayer 'Patient Trust' held such meaning for me.

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### **Synodal Signposts**

As a lifelong reader of T.S. Eliot, some phrases from his work stick in my mind like a mantra, and I mull over them from time to time and find new interpretations and nuances which suit the present time. I recently penned a theological essay using as my starting point the killer one-liner from Sweeney Agonistes: 'I gotta use words when I talk to you' and reflected on familiar words in our faith life which tend to downplay the ministry of lay people....'ordination', 'ontological change', 'solemn promises of obedience' as pledged at ordination, whilst lay people are simply expected to 'do what Father says', and seem to be systematically excluded from full participation in decision making, governance and pastoral ministry.

I now offer some familiar words, 21st century expressions which I think might resonate with readers of all ages and status.

### **Counting the Days**

'Counting the Days' to a child usually means looking forward to a birthday or marking off the number of 'sleeps' on an Advent Calendar before Christmas. Adults, too, count down the days to great events, or even prosaic ones like pay day when they can go to the supermarket confident that the debit/credit card will not be rejected at the checkout. For the Church's lay faithful and for many who have walked away from the institution which failed them, the Synod and its ongoing development may well offer some significant entries in their faith diary.

### 'Restore Factory Settings' and 'Software Upgrade'

The reality in many parishes is that most priests recognise that they do not have all the gifts and skills to support a community of missionary disciples. Others, however, exhibit a form of 'clero fascism' which deadens the spirit and empties the pews. It is fair to acknowledge that the lay faithful do not presume that their calling as members of 'a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's own people' (1 Peter 2:9), entitles them to

preside at Eucharist and minister the sacraments. They do, however, wish to share in these roles in ways which are appropriate to them. Sacramental theology is not set in stone and mandated ministries now include lay presiders at Liturgies of Word and Communion, authorised officiants at marriage ceremonies and presiders at funerals. These roles would have been unimaginable in a Church with an abundance of ordained priests.

So, in suggesting words as a metaphor for future developments in ministry to the People of God, I would offer words used by the communications industry – 'Restore Factory Settings' and 'Software Upgrade'. In this case, the settings would be the dual drivers of Vatican II – resourcement (back to the sources) and aggiornamento (bringing up to date). Like the varied gifts listed by St Paul in 1 Corinthians 12:28 (apostles, prophets, teachers, miracle workers, healers, helpers, administrators and speakers in tongues), here is an opportunity for contemporary laity and clergy to model their ministry, values and conduct on these earlier ambassadors for the Kingdom. As an official affirmation of their work of communion and mission, the late Pope Francis mandated the inclusion of women within the instituted ministries





of acolyte and lector and raised the status of the Catechist. He also extended the right of women to speak and to vote at the synodal gathering of 2024, after which, perhaps, ministry might be further diversified to include female deacons and nonstipendiary priests who work part-time hours as priests whilst continuing in their secular employment.

So, to conclude with another snippet from T.S. Eliot, this time from his poem Dry Salvages: (Four Quartets)

We had the experience but missed the meaning, And approach to the meaning restores the experience In a different form....

Perhaps this is what the synodal journey will encourage us to do – to approach the meaning of the Lord's teaching for our time and context. We are called, not simply to speak the word of God as ancient, immutable carvings on tablets of stone, but that, as the Body of Christ, we ourselves embody the Word of God, the Logos. Ministry as service through kindness and attentive listening without harsh judgement may provide the best signposts to 'the good life' and days which are counted as having been truly blessed.


