Sunday Reflection

THEME: THE CROSS, OUR HOPE AND STRENGTH

We are celebrating today the feast of the exaltation of the Cross. The cross which was a sign of weakness and failure has become the sign of our power, hope and strength. In the past, the cross was a most cruel and horrible means of torture. Death on a cross was a kind of execution reserved for bandits, rebel slaves, and for those who committed the most brutal crimes. So to declare oneself to be a follower of someone who had been crucified would have been foolish, shameful, and contrary to common sense. Ironically, it is this same cross which is our victory, strength and hope.

Our salvation is gained for us by way of the Cross. That is why the Cross remains a sign of our hope and strength. This was prefigured in the Old Testament by the first reading of today. The Jews suffered and experienced death in the desert because of their complaining attitude against Yahweh. They died because of the fiery serpents among them that bit them. When they came to their senses and pleaded with Moses to intercede for them, God said "Make a fiery serpent and put it on a standard. If anyone is bitten and looks at it, he shall live" (Num 21:8). This was a symbol of the Cross that healed the people in the desert from their distress.

This symbol is realized in the life of Christ when he hung upon the wood of the Cross for the salvation of mankind. This was the greatest sign of God's love for mankind for as St. John tells us in the gospel: "God loved the world so much that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him May not be lost but may have eternal life. For God sent his Son into the world not to condemn the world, but so that through him the world might be saved" (Jn3:16-17). It is this love that made Christ to leave all heavenly glory in order to suffer and die for our sake, our salvation. By his death on the Cross, he has brought victory over the ancient serpent and has given us the sure hope of an inheritance that can never be spoiled.

Today's feast therefore is inviting us to contemplate the Cross which is the symbol of our faith; a symbol of our victory over death. Our veneration and contemplation of the Cross should not be limited just to bowing and kissing the crucifix but should be a sincere and humble desire to suffer for the sake of others. If we must contemplate the Cross, then we need to choose the Cross as the guiding sign for our lives accepting it as part and parcel of our lives as Christians. The cross may come in various forms in our lives: sickness, poverty, misunderstandings, false accusations, marital squabbles, stubborn children, etc. When wefaced these crosses daily, we should not shun or complain about them but ask God for the graces to carry them daily as his

son did. We must as well pray that these crosses should not weigh us down but bring us closer to Christ. Avoiding any spirituality that shuns the Cross is a battle we must fight daily.

It is sad to see today in some parts of the western world that the cross, which is a symbol of unity is being pushed away and hidden from public view. If you go to my country and into schools and some public spaces, the display of the crucifix is a reminder to us of the place of the cross in our lives and of what Jesus did to win salvation for us. Today something it is not a good thing to have the crucifix in schools or public spaces as it may be offensive to some. This is an utter denial of the very means of our salvation. As we celebrate this feast, i would like us to remember two things:

First, we rejoice that something so terrible should have been transformed into a means of redemption for the whole human race.

Second, we remind ourselves of the fact that Christianity is not an abstract and spiritual religion. It springs from God's direct intervention in the affairs of the world, a real historical event involving real people and, in the end, a real execution on a real cross. We may theorize and theologize all we like; but all our theorizings and theologizings are nothing without the history on which they are based. Take away that history — take away the Cross — and Christianity is nonsense.

By his wounds we have been healed. Therefore, let us pray for the graces to bring healing in the lives of others as we take up our daily crosses to follow Christ. Let the cross shine out in our lives in the way we carry the burdens of life.

NEW APPROACH TO GODPARENTS FOR BAPTISM

We have come to realise that some parents do not understand the difference between a Godparent and a witness for baptism. This has led to situations where none Catholics have stood as Godparents for their children. As a clarification, a witness at baptism can be anyone from any denomination or one without a religion. But a Godparent must be a practicing Catholic and one who is able to receive the sacraments. In this light, we would be introducing a form that parents who want their children to be baptised must send to the Godparents so that their Parish priest can fill and sign to testify that they are practicing Catholics and regular in their sacramental lives.

JUBILEE PLANNING MEETING OUTCOME

The ongoing parish activities during this jubilee year, Pilgrims of Hope are as follows. First Friday adoration to be done in our parish churches after masses from 10am to 6pm. Parishioners encouraged to sign up for adoration time slots.

FIRST HOLY COMMUNION (FHC) PROGRAM 2025

Our FHC program this year will take a different approach. Only children of regular and practicing parishioners will be enrolled for the program this year and we shall need a maximum of 30 children for Corpus Christi and the rest will go over to St. Joseph. Forms will be collected from both churches, and the registration will all be done and submitted on the same day during a meeting with prospective candidates and parents on Thursday 25th September 2025 at 6pm at the Corpus Christi church. The parents will have a greater role to play in the primary instruction of the children especially on memorising basic prayers and the responses at mass. Once we are convinced that this has been done properly, then the children will begin with the sessions after a retreat.
