Wisdom 9: 13-18

Philemon 9-10, 12-17

Gospel Luke 14: **Page 133** Gospel Luke 14: 25-33

In the first reading from Wisdom says we can't know God's ways on our own it is beyond human capacity. We need the Holy Spirit to guide us as our earthly concerns cloud our judgement. Trust in God's wisdom to make the right choices in life and help us see beyond our own fears and desires that lead us to make decisions that bring real peace, meaning and fulfilment. In the second reading St Paul is an old man now and in prison. Onesimus has been accompanying St Paul, originally as a servant, from very soon after his conversion as has become a brother disciple. He sends him back to Philemon not as a slave but as a fellow disciple and brother in Christ. This indicates how faith in Christ changes how we see and treat others. Luke's Gospel is a great challenge of how we must be real followers of Him. Jesus uses hyperbole to stress the need for total commitment, putting Him first above all else, including relationships, possessions and personal plans. Discipleship requires being "all in". When we make Jesus our priority, everything else falls into place. Loving Jesus helps us love others better because our lives are grounded in Him. Are we fully committed or holding back? We must live as true disciples of Jesus. M

Mass times Feast Days

6 pm Confessions 6.30pm Vigil Mass Irene Delves RIP **Theophilus** Thomas RIP

Saturday 6th St Bega, Anchoress of Cumbria Irish princes born in the 7th century. Escaped from Ireland after being promised in marriage to a pagan Viking prince as she wanted to stay a virgin and devote her life to Christ. She had a bracelet with a cross as a token of her heavenly betrothal. She landed at St Bees on the west coast of Cumbria, south of the present day town of Whitehaven. She built herself a cell in the grove of the forest near the seashore. Lived in solitude as an achoress dedicating her life to God for many years. When the area was raided by pirates St Oswald, King of Northumbria advised her to join a convent as a nun for her protection. She received the veil fron St Aidan, Bishop of Lindisfarne. Established a convent at St Bees from land she obtained by the snow miracle from the local landowner. St Bees Priory became famous and helped the oppressed and poor. Many miracles were associated with Abbess Bega. She died 690 just after St Hilda of Whitby.

Monday 8th September Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary Mary's birth and early life is not recorded in the Bible. The "Protoevangelium of James", finally written in the 2nd century, states Joachim and Anne as the parents of Mary. They were wealthy and pious members of the Jewish tribe of Judah. They prayed for children but remained childless for many years until the arrival of Mary. St Augustine of Hippo described the birth of the Virgin Mary as an event of cosmic and historic significance and an appropriate prelude to the birth of Jesus Christ. Anne "made a sanctuary" in the infant girl's room and "allowed nothing common or unclean" on account of the special holiness of the child. The same writing records that when Mary was one year old, her father "made a great feast and invited the priests, the scribes, the elders and all the people of Israel". Mary's parents, along with the temple priests, subsequently decided that she would be offered to God as a consecrated Virgin for the rest of her life and enter a chaste marriage with the carpenter Joseph.

10 am Mass Michael and Maura Duggan **RIP** (Kay's parents) Tuesday 9th St Peter Claver. Born 1580 in Spain. Went to Jesuit Barcelona University. Noted for his intelligence and devotion. Joined Jesuits. He was sent to study on island of Majorca. Advised by the humble porter Alphonsus Rodriguez to help slaves in the new Spanish colonies. Sent to Cartagena in Colombia one of the main ports for the slave trade. Studied theology and ordained a priest in 1616. Started to work with missionary Fr Alonso de Sandoval SJ who had worked for 40 years to minister to the slaves brought in terrible conditions from Africa. Fr Peter visited slaves on the ships as soon as they arrived, at slave markets and where they worked. When he visited plantations or the mines he stayed with the slaves as the owners were not pleased to see Fr Peter. He preached about the love of Jesus for everyone and was hearing Confessions and preparing baptism at the rate of 5,000 a year. He developed a team of assistants to help in his work. In 1650 caught a very virulent form of the plague and became inactive. Died 8th September 1654.

SVP Social 1 pm to 3 pm Wednesday 10th St Ambrose Barlow Born in 1585 near Manchester in Lancashire son of a knight in Barlow Hall. Family were reluctant converts to Church of England. Ambrose served as a page to a relative. Converted back to Catholicism aged 22. Went to English College in Douai, France. Then became a Benedictine monk and joined Downside Abbey in Somerset. Then part of English mission in Lancashire and returned to his home Barlow Hall. Then moved to nearby Morleys Hall were a pension for a priest was made available to him. Ministered in the area for 24 years. Often visited Wardley Hall, today the residence of the Bishop of Salford. Arrested 4 times but released. In March 1641 King Charles I decreed that all Catholic priests must leave the country within a month.

6.30 pm Mass For a speedy recovery for Ruba	More than a month later Ambrose was arrested saying Mass at Morleys Hall. Taken to Lancas Castle. Condemned to death. Martyred September 1641. His cousin Francis Downes rescued skull and preserved it at Wardley Hall, still there today. One of the 40 Martyrs of England and Wale									
Thursday 11 th St John Gabriel Perboyre Born 1802 in France. Ordained a Vincentian priest 1826. His brother Louis died while on a voyage for mission work in China. John Gabriel volunteered to take his place. Arrived Macau, China in 1835 and began to study the language. Five months late he arrived at Ho-Nan and started his missionary work serving the poverty stricken people. In 1836 moved to a mission in Hubei. In 1839 religious persecution started. Arrested by soldiers, torture and had a series of trials at which he admitted to be a Christian missionary. Refused to disclose information on other missionaries or denounce his faith. He was martyred tied to a cross are strangled by a rope around his neck on 11th September 1840.										
NO MASS	Friday 12th St Guy of Anderlecht Born about 950 into a poor very pious family in Anderlecht a village near Brusels, Belgium. They were not able to afford to give him an education but instructed him in thed Christain faith and its practices. From young he visited and cared for the poor and sick and lived a simple agricultural life. When Guy worked tilling the fields, an angel took over so he could spend more time in prayer. At age 14 he was made sacristan of his parish church. He shared his meager wages with the poor. He was then persuaded by a merchant to enter into a business with him to make more money to give to the poor. When the venture failed he considered it a sign that God wanted him to continue living a life of humble poverty. As penance for his greed he made pigrimages on foot to Rome and the Holy Land. He returned home and died there in 1012 aged about 62.									
Saturday 13 th St Notburga of Eben Devout peasant born 1265 in Austrian Tyrol. Cook for Count Henry of Rattenburg. Gave food to the poor. Countess Ottilia ordered her to feed all leftovers to the pigs. When Notburga did not obey the Countess had her dismisseed. Then worked for a farmer reaping corn. He agreed she would be free to attend church each week. One Saturday evening the vesper bell and she began to leave. The farmer told her she must continue cutting the grain as the weather was about to change. Notburga said: "Let the sickle decide between us". She threw the sickle in the air and it stayed suspended in the air. The farmer astonished let her go. Meanwhile Count Henry had remarried but suffered many difficulties which he ascribed to his dismial of Notburga. He rehired her as his housekeeper and the estate began to prosper again. Notburger resumed feeding the poor and continued happily till her death on 13 th September 1313
